

## Gender Pay Gap Reporting

We are an employer required by law to carry out Gender Pay Gap Reporting under the Equality Act 2010 (Gender Pay Gap Information) Regulations 2017.

This involves carrying out six calculations that show the difference between the average earnings of men and women in our organisation; it will not involve publishing individual employees data.

We are required to publish the results on our own website and a government website. We will do this within one calendar year of April 5<sup>th</sup> 2021.

We can use these results to assess:

- The levels of gender equality in our workplace
- The balance of male and female employees at different levels
- How effectively talent is being maximized and rewarded.

The challenge in our organisation and across Great Britain is to eliminate any gender pay gap.

Gender Pay Reporting requires our organisation to make calculations based on employee gender. We will establish this by using our existing HR and payroll records. All employees can confirm and update their records in regards to gender pay reporting if they chose to by contacting the HR department at our Barnsley Office on (+44) 01226 707500.

The below information relates to tax year ended 5th of April 2021 and is being reported in accordance with the Equality Act 2010 (Gender Pay Gap Information) Regulations 2017.

<b>Median basic Pay</b>	£	12.58	£	12.17

The Median is calculated by looking at all relevant employees over the past 12 months separated by gender and looking at the middle employee's hourly basic rate. Males are paid on average 3% more than females.

<b>Mean basic pay</b>	£	14.27	£	13.58
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The Mean is calculated by looking at all relevant employees over the past 12 months separated by gender and looking at average hourly basic rate each gender gets paid. Males are paid on average 69 pence more.

<b>Mean bonus pay</b>	£	1,919.00	£	1,954.50
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The Mean Bonus is calculated by looking at all relevant employees over the past 12 months separated by gender and looking at average bonus rate each gender gets paid. Women on average get paid £35.50 more bonus per year than men.

<b>Percentage difference in Mean bonus pay</b>	-2%	2%
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As a percentage Men are paid 2% less bonus than Women conversely Women are therefore paid 2% more than Men.
